Tennessee Tech University is engaged in the most expansive building campaign in the school's history; however, no significant improvements in Tech's football facilities have been made in 50 years. Built in 1966, Tucker Stadium — the home of Golden Eagle football — is 58 years old.

A new football operations center will enhance the student-athlete experience. It will add to the university's appeal, create regional and national media coverage, raise awareness of the institution and expand the local economy. It will assist with recruiting, increase student enrollment and provide an exciting and affordable entertainment experience for the Upper Cumberland. The new facility will elevate fundraising and donor stewardship as well.

Once student-athletes arrive at Tech, the new facility will develop their talent and elevate them to their full potential. It will even the playing field among Big South - OVC peer institutions and beyond and strengthen both the team and the overall athletics program.

A winning football program benefits Tennessee Tech and the local communities, and a new football operations center will provide opportunities for fellowship among student-athletes. Some of the most important lessons of leadership and teamwork happen outside of the classroom. The center will foster a sense of brotherhood and culture and form unbreakable bonds that will last a lifetime. It will keep students engaged and motivated to finish their degree. In short, it is critical to their success.

Tradition and Reputation


Tennessee Tech football has a long, proud tradition. Tech played its first football game, against Cumberland University, in fall 1922 and claimed its 100th football win in 1951 against Carson Newman.

Tech has won 10 OVC Championships — more than any other school currently in the OVC. The program boasts 33 All Americans and 13 players who went on to actively play in the NFL.

Tech football alumni are talented both on and off the field. Everyone knows astronaut Barry Wilmore and singing sensation Jake Hoot, but many may not realize that these successful alumni got their start, like so many others, on the Tech football field. Tech football legends like Larry Schreiber, Jim Youngblood, Lonnie Warwick, Elois Grooms, Mike Hennigan and Frank Omiyale inspired future generations of players and paved the way for their success. These players left a legacy, and Tech hopes to create a legacy for future generations as well.

As Tech's 13th head football coach, Bobby Wilder believes strongly in the history and tradition of 100 years of Tech football, and Tech's football offices proudly display photos of former coaches, championship teams, helmets and retired jerseys.

In almost 100 years of football, nearly two million people have attended a Tech football game. Tech football extends far beyond just Tech alumni. Friends, family, local business owners and citizens from across the Upper Cumberland attend these games. As the university approaches the 100th anniversary of Tennessee Tech football, the time to invest in student-athletes is now.



The new football operations center will be situated in close proximity to the Athletics Performance Center, located across from the Hooper Eblen Center, off 12th Street. This location will provide student-athletes with convenient access to the strength and conditioning room facilities and the indoor 10,000-square-foot practice turf at the APC.

Features

The new 40,000-square-foot facility is designed to provide a wow factor for football recruits and current student-athletes. The facility will place specific emphasis on technology, with touch screens and displays in the lobby. It will be a showplace for Tech's football program and will allow Tech Athletics to use technology in their recruiting. Photographs, jerseys, plaques and memorabilia of championship teams, All Americans, All Conference players and academic success will be displayed throughout the building, highlighting 100 years of Tennessee Tech football. Student-athletes and alumni will feel a sense of pride when they walk into the football operations center.

Health and safety have always been a priority for Tech Athletics, but never has this been more important than right now. The new center will be the primary sports medicine, athletics training and physical therapy facility for the entire athletics department, servicing all 15 teams and approximately 325 student-athletes. The physical health and well-being of student-athletes are critical to meeting goals and developing championship-level programs.

- Sports medicine staff offices







Economic Impact

Tennessee Tech contributes \$765 million annually to the Upper Cumberland region, and the football program alone supports more than 140 student-athletes, coaches and support staff.



"At one time, approximately 70% of the university's budget came from the state. That's not the case anymore. Today it's closer to 30%, and the state does not support building or maintenance expenses for athletic facilities. Private funding for projects like this must fill the gap, and the investment will pay off. Fans who come to games eat in restaurants in the area. They shop at local businesses. Tennessee Tech football touches every part of this community."
